Abbey Community Diary

JUNE

Barnwell Road Library exhibition: The history of local fairs - in the run up to the 800th anniversary of Midsummer Fair's charter (1211). King John granted a charter to the monks of Barnwell Priory to hold a fair every Midsummer. The income was very valuable. Centuries after the priory was closed and dismantled, the fair continues but the trading activities have mainly been replaced by amusements. Other trading fairs included the Garlic and Stourbridge Fairs.

Summer outing to Lowestoft

Abbey Action's annual community outing for Abbey residents. To Lowestoft on SUNDAY 14th August.

The popular community outing has visited Hunstanton, Lowestoft, Great Yarmouth and Southend in previous years. Abbey Action members have decided to visit Lowestoft this year (last visit in July 2008). Residents and their friends and families are welcome to come.

Lowestoft is the most easterly town in Britain. It has expansive beaches, classic seafront gardens, harbour, two piers, a variety of indoor and outdoor attractions and a rich maritime heritage – a mix for visitors of all ages.

The town came into prominence during the 1840s – its historic origins and colourful past are depicted through a number of museums. Once a flourishing fishing port, it still has a fish market & docks and traditional smokehouses together with a Heritage Vessel Mooring, which has a changing programme of visiting craft throughout the year



TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS

As usual, there will be 3 different coach pick up points:

1. Rayson Way/Rawlyn Road (starting approx. 8.30am)
2. Wadloes Road (approx. 8.40am)
3. Thorpe Way, by Ditton Court - near Ditton Lane junction (approx. 8:45am)

A Dial-A-Ride minibus will pick up passengers with limited mobility and their helpers, starting approximately 8.30pm.

Abbey and Coleridge Action for Youth (AaCAfY)

"We have been running activities for 11-17 year olds in the Abbey for just over a year now and we're aiming to continue to do so for a lot longer." says local resident Anna Constantas. "We ask young people what activities they want to access locally and then we do our best to provide them (with a little help from funders, youth workers, Cambridge United, local residents and councillors)."

"Around 25 young people play football on the AstroTurf pitch by the Abbey pool every Friday afternoon and they are really keen. Last winter, we only had to cancel one session (when the pitch was totally invisible). We ran a street art project last year with a local artist, Libby Morley, called CB5 and the artwork was displayed in the Grafton Centre for three weeks. Hopefully, some of you saw it but for those who didn't, here's a taster."



"We are just about to complete another street art project. Jadryk Brown, a local, young street artist whose work you will have seen on Newmarket Road, just past Coldhams Lane, has been working with several young people and there will be a display of their art in the very near future. We're hoping to secure the Grafton Centre again so keep a lookout for it."

"Another group of young people worked with Hilary Cox, an artist who is also a local resident during the Easter Holidays. Just look at the fantastic hotel for bugs that they built in the grounds of the Scout Hut on Stanesfield Road. I took a picture of a newt that I found just days after they completed the luxury accommodation. The group learned about local bugs and their favourite habitats and they worked really well as a team for almost a week."

"We're hoping to continue to run the football sessions (funding is always an issue for us) and we have more plans for art in the coming weeks. Watch this space!

Restoring the 'lost gardens' of East Barnwell

Progress is continuing in the restoration of the 'lost gardens' of East Barnwell Community Centre. Keith Jordan, Project worker for the Abbey Action project, is overseeing the garden makeover. Overgrown buddleia (butterfly) bushes have been pruned and the perennial weeds and bramble, that have spread throughout the borders, are being controlled before planting up later in the year. A few plants have been put in to give some colour this summer.

THANK YOU! We were most thankful for some local residents who responded to our appeal in the last newsletter and donated unwanted garden tools – these included garden spades, forks, shovels, hoes, rakes, a wheel barrow, hedging shears and other equipment. Any others can be used in other projects in the Abbey area (The Fields Allotment Project).

Volunteers are most welcome to join Keith with the project on some weekday mornings. It's a chance to gain some garden skills, get some exercise and help the independently-run community centre. Refreshments will be provided.

Tasks for the summer months include: removing the perennial weeds, propagating plants, helping create a garden area for the See Saw Playgroup children. Please contact Keith (who is based at the centre) – see contact details on front page.



The Fields Community Allotment

The sheltered allotment within The Fields Children's Centre, off Galfrid Road, has been the focus of much community involvement over the spring. Despite very cold December weather and a dry spring broad beans and Swiss chard have been harvested and autumn-planted onion sets and peas are coming on. Soft fruit bushes (black and red currants, and blackberry) were planted last autumn to complement the apple and pear trees.

During Family Allotment days, produce has been harvested, raised beds weeded, potatoes have been planted (stacked car tyre method) and other produce sown to keep up a regular supply of produce. For anyone interested it's a great way to learn about growing your own produce. Family sessions (includes soft play for children) take place once a month but volunteers are also keeping the plots tidy

Riverside Community Day

Some photos from the recent event...



The grassy area round the Cellarer's Chequer building was ideal for a summer event. Local residents from the Riverside Area Residents Association put on great selection of cakes while buskers sang in and around the building that has a monastic atmosphere. Barnwell & Fen Ditton Local History Society and local author Ann Hales-Tooke explained the interesting and well-documented history of the stone building. It is the only surviving part of the former Barnwell Priory established by Augustinian Canons around 1112-1153 on land at Barnwell Springs ('The Children's Springs'). Representatives from Cambridge City Church (Brickfields), Christ Church, the local police team, Streetcar and Personal Health Trainers from East Barnwell Health Centre also attended. Christ Church, who oversees Abbey Church, opened up the doors for people to see inside the 13th century church.

Thorpe Way Action Day

On Saturday 7th May Thorpe Way estate in Abbey was host to a community action day. The event was organised by City Homes South in conjunction with Barnwell Baptist Church. The day was supported by over 50 volunteers from local churches and community teamed up with City Council Officers, Police and other agencies to help run the community clean-up.

Volunteers helped residents to clear out unwanted furniture and tidy up overgrown gardens. Over 30 households were assisted on the day along with another 40 plus households making use of the skips and recycling facilities on the day.

Residents were able to pass on or pick up unwanted furniture, clothing, books, bikes, toys, shoes and other household items in a 'Take It Or Leave It' re-use area. Many leftover items were passed on to local charities or taken to recycling banks, including 30 carrier bags of clothes and shoes.

A tonne of garden waste, two tonnes of wood, half a tonne of metal, 28 TV's, six microwaves, 1 stand up sun-bed and four fridges were collected for recycling. Six tonnes of general rubbish were disposed of.

Looking after your pets

Keeping Small Rabbits and Guinea Pigs Safe Over The Summer

Rabbits and guinea pigs can suffer during hot weather, especially if kept in an outdoor hutch. Their welfare is in your hands so check this **6 point 'action plan'** to keep yours happy and healthy:

1. Ensure hutch and run are fox proof with bolts and strong wire mesh (foxes are common around the city!);
2. Check your pets have access to shade during the day;
3. Replenish water and hay every day;
4. Make sure rabbits are up to date with vaccinations: Myxomatosis vaccinations should be every 6 months.
5. Ask your vet about preventing 'flystrike' that kills in hours - an especial risk with hutch-bound rabbits.
6. Ensure you clean the hutch every week to discourage flies and fleas and check your pets daily for any problems.

Did you know that new welfare guidelines say that rabbits should have hutches **at least** 5ft by 2ft by 2ft - larger for the large breeds? They should have a secure attached run where they can exercise every day. Rabbits and guinea pigs love hopping and running and will suffer from health problems if they have not got enough space to do so. Now



is also a great time to think about getting a companion for your pet if they are on their own. Local rescue centres such as Wood Green always has lots of small furry creatures in urgent need of re-homing and will advise you on the tricky introductions!
